Year 8 Retreat

Year 8 retreats to Savio House, Bollington started on a cool May day but that did not stop us all having a most reflective day filled with activities, and opportunities to play in the games room and outside. The retreat was led

by the Savio House team. Students began with a series of ice breaker activities before splitting into 4 groups. These groups were not based on friendships and provided students with a wonderful opportunity to work with other people in their year group. The activities were based on the "Bridges" theme of the

day. Students had to work together to solve problems and succeed in their task.
Students discussed what they had learnt about themselves before we had a final reflection as we considered who in our lives was important in



the building blocks of our own personal bridge. Well done to our students for their excellent behaviour and participation in the day.





8C, 8F, 8N, 8M and 8S visited Savio House, Bollington the following week for their retreat day. They worked on the theme of "Bridges" as they took part in a wide range of team building games and activities. The games included being able to plan how to drop an egg out of a window without it breaking, passing a hoopla hoop in an unbroken chain, work out how to cross the electric maze and creating a shape with a rope while blindfolded. Students also had the opportunity to relax and enjoy time together. The final liturgy led by Father Roman brought together the theme for the day and sent the students out to act upon what they had learnt.



Living Joyfully: Vocations

Ahead of Vocations Sunday (8th May), a number of our Year 9 forms and 8M were fortunate enough to be able to take part in a Vocations session with some individuals from a variety of Religious Communities on Wednesday. 8M spoke to 2 Religious Sisters and a Priest, who had spent 30 years in Africa. The students were able to ask any questions and these varied from, "How do they/we know the right path for God?", "How do we hear God?", "Why are they called 'Sister'?" and "What do they miss or consider they sacrificed?". This last question raised the most emotion in 8M when we heard one of the sisters put her German Shepherd puppy up for adoption; not because she had to (to be part of the community) but, rather, so that she wasn't attached to anything that would distract her from worshipping God.

Blaire V in Year 9 said of the event, 'The Sisters helped give Year 9 an insight into what the lives of nuns are like. However, the most important thing we learnt from this opportunity was what the meaning of peace is.' The event was a well received experience offering insight into the life of a religious that we wouldn't ordinarily be able to access.

Thanks to Mrs Sutton who coordinated the virtual vocations day which gave our students the opportunity to hear from and discuss Religious Vocations.

Each year students and staff across the College commit to raising the funds needed to maintain the All Saints Health Centre in Varasanadu (see picture of our students there in 2020) In doing so we make a difference to the quality of lives of over 20,000 women, men and children in the surrounding area. By financially supporting the work of the Presentation Sisters we are able to provide: prescription medicines; health checks; natural fertility care and advice; vaccination programmes and alcohol rehabilitation; as well as health education and skills



education. This year our amazing students, staff and parents have once again worked hard, displaying the All Hallows Core Values of Compassion, Cooperation and Honourable Purpose to raise the fantastic total of £5,821.61! This has been done through form fundraising which have included cake sales, 'Guess the Sweets in a jar' competition, a cross bar challenge, to name but a few activities! Our sixth form students raised a large proportion of the total through a series of annual events: All Hallows Has Talent, Fancy Dress Day, the Faith in Action Fair and the Staff V Students Football Match.

Sixth Form General RE: Talk on Refugees

Refugees Welcome Cheshire East Chair and ex- All Hallows teacher of 25 years, Nicky Campbell visited All Hallows and spoke to our Year 12 students part of their General RE course. Here, the proud mum of Gogglebox BAFTA winner Leon Campbell, told us all about the charity that she chairs in Cheshire East.

The students were asked to consider various questions, in a 'Gogglebox' manner and there was a good buzz about the room.

They began by thinking of the Parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke's Gospel), read very well by Sam. They were



asked to think about the question "who is my neighbour" and this was then linked to their consideration of a refugee's situation and experience. This, obviously, was linked to the current Ukraine crisis. However, Mrs Campbell was clear to point out that she got involved in the charity when the Syrian refugees were fleeing because of war, followed by the Afghan refugees trying to escape the fall of the regime in August 2021 and now of course, the current Ukraine crisis.

The reason she got involved is because of her own family history; Jewish pogroms forced her ancestors to leave a part of the world we now know as Ukraine.

Mrs Campbell also helped the students to think about the quality of their donations to such charities. Reminding us to consider the culture and religious beliefs of the refugees; ensuring suitable clothing and food donations for instance. She encouraged gifts of money instead; ena-

bling the refugees to buy what they needed.

However, she also made a plea for the students to donate their time. Encouraging them to consider the ages of the people forced to leave and come to the UK. These people were their own age and they can do things that would be valued by the young people with people their own ages. This might also help our students to help with meeting their DofE and Sixth Form volunteer hours obligations.

She advised that there is a drop in at St Michael's Church in Macclesfield each Saturday for hosts and the refugees and any volunteers would be welcome. If you are interested in being a part of this initiative but live elsewhere, please check the <u>website</u> for details.

Each day has enough trouble of its own."

Father Martin Coyle from St Gregory's RC Church, Bollington spoke eloquently in his homily about the visit of Pope John Paul II to England 40 years ago this week. For Father Martin it proved a turning point in his life as he felt God calling him to be a priest. He told the young people to trust in God as they journey on the path he has chosen for them.

Mr Beesley reassured the students that the best is yet to come as they leave All Hallows and start university, college, apprenticeships, employment or voluntary work.

We wish Year 13 success in their exams and we will continue to pray for them as a College community in the future.

Aberystwyth Trip

Seventy Five year twelve students made their way to Aberystwyth University for a three day residential. This was our first post-Covid group visit to a university. Students got an experience of student life, staying in halls of residence, attending lectures, fieldwork and attending student socials.

Lectures

The history was really interesting as it taught us about how history can be seen in a wider perspective than just popular view, while also how sources such as letters and newspapers can demonstrate how small towns and places such as Aberystwyth can play a wider role than we'd realise in history. All Hallows Awarded the Eco Schools Green Flag

Congratulations to Mrs Sutton and our Eco Council as All Hallows has once again been awarded the Eco-Schools Green Flag. The assessing team commented on many positive aspects of the Eco Council's work, including the following comments:

'We love that you have such a large Eco-Committee – this shows your schools excellent commitment to both the programme and the Eco-cause. An adaptable team effort is vital for fighting climate change and your school really demonstrated that. We really liked your action-focussed and practical approach to Eco Committee meetings. It's a productive way to work and yielded great results. 20 meetings is a really great amount and testament to a committee Committee. We love how active your Eco-Committee was in communicated Eco-Schools activity school-wide. Shared emails, training, Twitter, fortnightly meetings, messages in the ewsletter and on the school notice board, plus relaying via form tutors, all combine to make a great approach!



Pupils at All Hallows Catholic College collaborated with Mrs K Sutton to conduct an environmental review, assessing how eco-friendly their school is. They reviewed everything from the school's recycling practices, to energy usage, to how environmental themes are covered in classrooms. Building on their findings, the pupils and Mrs K Sutton planned a year of activities that would up their green credentials.

The group connected their work to 3 Eco-Schools topics: Marine, Water and Energy.

Activities included establishing a way forward to raise awareness of the limited supplies of water as well as how we may be harmfully affecting our marine life through

the use of balloons and confetti (both of which are on the rise). The students have been instrumental in a whole-school initiative to help to raise awareness through the help of Water Aid. Pupils are aware they sometimes take water for granted and this endeavour is helping all of us to be more considerate of our limited resources.'

Eco-Schools England Manager, Adam Flint, said: "Earning an Eco-Schools Green Flag Award takes passion, commitment and a desire to make a difference. Pupils should be proud of their great work. They're an inspiration and it makes us feel heartened and positive about the future of our planet.

Assembly by Eco Council on Sustainable Fashion

The ECO Council put together an informative and thoughtful assembly on Sustainable Fashion and Care for our Common Home - Laudato Si, which they delivered to all year groups in May. Bella C, James L, Michael S, Oisin M, Poppy H, Ella D, Rebecca S, Theo B, Rebecca H, Rachel R, Jack T, Carrie P, Angel E, and Abu F were all instrumental in pulling together and helping to lead a fabulous and reflective assembly on Sustainable Fashion, and how as Christians this is one very practical way of putting our Values of Stewardship and the call of Pope Francis in Laudato Si into practice in our own lives.

With their hard work and enthusiasm in their delivery, including wearing and showing off their pre-loved and Sustainable Fashion clothes during most of the week, we able to help the students to understand the real cost of Fast Fashion compared with Sustainable Fashion. This included raising awareness of the conditions that the workers are forced to work in, including facing rape and abortion, as well as the environmental cost of making and dying clothes that are worn a few times and discarded.

Year 11 Geography Trip to Iceland

After a relatively stress-free journey through Manchester Airport and flight, students and staff checked into the Viking Hotel in Reykjavík. Before dinner in the amazing dining room that was set up like a Viking ship, students were able to take advantage of the Suðurbæjarlaug Thermal Swimming Pool located round the corner from the hotel.

The first day was very busy with the party taking the Golden Circle Tour which included a swim in the Secret Lagoon Natural Pool. Then a visit to the Kerid Crater, the Gulfoss Waterfall, followed by some time waiting for the Great Geysir to erupt. The final stop of the day was at Thingvellir National Park.

The second day was just as busy. The first stops on the South Shore Tour were at the Seljalandsfoss Waterfall and the Skogafoss Waterfall. After this, students got to walk on the black sand of Reynishverfi Beach and spend time at the Dyrolaey Peninsular. The last stop saw the group take part in a walk on the Solheimajokull glacier.

Year 13 History Trip to New York City

Year 13 A Level History students, along with Mr Martin and Mrs Bell-Smith, travelled to New York City for a week of the Easter holiday to visit some important sites related to the topic: The Making of a Superpower the USA 1865-1975. Students had an amazing time and experienced NYC in all its glory as the city of skyscrapers and, the city that never sleeps. Students participated in historical visits in the day and they were given the last day to do their shopping. Each evening we all gathered to try a different New York cuisine (pizza, burger, bagel and pretzels, for example). Our hotel was located just off Times Square, so students were in the heart of New York surrounded by bustling traffic.

Day 1:- Students visited the tenement museum looking at life for immigrants into the city in the 19th century. We also went to St. Patrick's Old Basilica where the catacombs run under the ground. We toured the catacombs and listened to the history of Catholicism in New York. In the evening we sat with a cappuccino in the sun looking out on the Hudson River while joggers passed by.





Day 2:- Visit to the Historical Society Museum which had a replica of the Oval Office. We also visited the Museum of the Native Indian, had a tour of Wall Street and Federal Hall to see where the famous 1929 crash happened. In the evening we went to the Rockefeller Plaza.

Day 3:- Students took the ferry to the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island immigration Centre. In the afternoon we toured the 9/11 Memorial Museum and the fountain memorial on the foundations of the old World Trade Centre. Students went up the Empire State Building in the evening but we couldn't see a thing. It was incredibly windy and we were literally in the clouds. The students and staff had an amazing time jumping

around in the wind and this became a highlight of the trip!



Day 4:- Students had the day to shop in NYC. They visited Fifth Avenue and then we had a trip to Macys. In the evening we took the subway to Brooklyn and walked back into Manhattan across the Brooklyn Bridge.

Mr Martin said: 'It was great to get away after all the Covid troubles. Students got to end their time at All Hallows' on a high. They benefited incredibly from seeing the USA. New York City is important to many people over the world as the location of their new life in the New World. Sometimes, international historical study can seem far away and distant



compared to British history. Students got to see how exciting American history is and could humanise some of the individuals from their course.

Mother Tongue, Other Tongue Poetry Competition

On Thursday 15th July we took a group of 12 Year 8 students to Manchester Metropolitan University for a celebration event of the poetry competition 'Mother Tongue Other Tongue'. Mother Tongue Other Tongue is a national Laureate Education Project, led by Professor Carol Ann Duffy DBE (UK Poet Laureate 2009-

2019). The Mother Tongue part of the competition requires children who do not have English as a first language, or who speak a different language at home, to share a lullaby, poem or song from their Mother Tongue. This can be remembered, or passed on, or it can be an original piece. They then write a short piece in English to explain the poem's significance to them. The Other Tongue part of the competition encourages children learning another language in school to use that language creatively to write a poem.

We were incredibly proud of all of the students we took with us, who had all produced fantastic poems, however we were especially pleased with the efforts of Gianna, Sean, Rebecca and Jemima who all won in their categories. With over 1200 entries from across the North West, our students did fantastically well! The day started with our students taking part in poetry workshops with published poets who work with MMU, including Valerie Bloom who recently won the 2022 CLiPPA (CLPE Children's Poetry Award), the UK's only award for published poetry for children.

We then moved into a lecture theatre where the winners were announced. There, we were privileged to be spoken to by Carol Ann Duffy who performed some poetry for us.

We had a fantastic day and our students were impeccably behaved - we hope to enter the competition again next year!









Students Become Anti-Bullying Ambassadors

On Wednesday 27th April a group of student volunteers across all years were trained by The Diana Award Charity to become Anti-Bullying Ambassadors (ABA's). ABAs are students who, through their training, will change the attitudes, behaviour, and culture towards bullying in their school. 'I enjoyed talking to clients and the team as they were all super nice and helpful with giving me lots of information.'


'I really enjoyed interacting with younger children and helping them learn.'




Year 7 History Trip to Beeston Castle

Our Year 7 students have been able to explore both the prehistoric and medieval life within Beeston castle on this trip. They took part in two work shops led by English Heritage. The first was called Stone Keep castles, where students learnt about life in the castle, Medieval weaponry and warfare, as well as how the castle was attacked



and defended. This involved a tour around the keep including enjoying the views from the top of the castle where you could see as far as Snowdon and Liverpool. The second workshop was about the prehistoric settlers at Beeston and what the site was used for in the Stone and Bronze Ages. Students got to spend some time in the prehistoric round house and handle various different artefacts including Stone Age tools and having a go at grinding wheat on different grindstones







MEP Intensive Study Event at Sheffield University

Our Year 10 Mandarin Excellence Programme (MEP) students took part in a 4-day Intensive Study event: the MEP Tourism Project. Students first followed an online course in school for 3 days last week, and then attended a face-to-face day at the University of Sheffield this Thursday. Over the online courses, students worked together in small groups to create a marketing campaign to attract Chinese tourists to Macclesfield, including making posters and creating videos.

During the day at the University of Sheffield our students had a campus tour with East Asian Studies students. The lead lecturer of the Chinese Department then gave an exciting lecture about the modern city of Shanghai. Our students really enjoyed the trip, especially the video presentations from several MEP schools about 'introducing the place you live' as the perfect ending.

In this project, students enjoyed the great opportunity to enrich their Chinese vocabulary about tourism and get creative to show off their hometowns.

Year 7 Mandarin Activity Day

On 23rd June Thursday, our Year 7 Mandarin students attended a Chinese Activity Day at Edge Hill University hosted by the Confucius Institute.

Students were led by Mrs Denby, Miss Chen and Mr Bradshaw. They were welcomed by Confucius Institute staff on their arrival and then had a brief tour of campus. During the day, they had cultural workshops of paper cutting, the Chinese New Year Festival, Calligraphy and Dragon dancing. The workshops brought students closer to Chinese culture, in addition to their Mandarin language lessons at school and will help foster their understanding of Chinese customs and local life.

Students thoroughly enjoyed the experience and appreciated this great opportunity to shine at Mandarin. All Hallows and University staff were very pleased with students' achievement throughout the day's activities and hoped for further similar opportunities in the future.









Year 8 Art Trip to the Yorkshire Sculpture Park

Year 7 Geography Field Trip to Castleton

Students travelled the short distance to the Peak District to explore the limestone formations in Speedwell Cavern, as well as walk the Broken Road.





Year 10 History Trip to Belgium

In July, 42 Year 10 GCSE History students visited the World War One battlefields and cemeteries in Belgium. The itinerary included Essex Farm Cemetery, where the poet John McCrae wrote the famous poem 'In Flanders Fields'. Here we also viewed the grave of Valentine Strudwick, who lied about his age to get into the army and died at 15 years old. Students then visited Tyne Cot cemetery where thousands of Commonwealth soldiers were laid to rest. Even to this day, bodies of WW1 soldiers are still being found on the Ypres salient. Only last week, six soldiers were unearthed. One student, Samuel Howard, was able to locate the name of his Great Grandfather on a memorial panel. The sheer scale of the number of casualties hit home to the students. Students also visited the German cemetery at Langemark. Langemark cemetery is one of only four First World War German cemeteries in the Flanders region. Almost 25,000 soldiers are buried in a mass grave. The Germans remember their war dead not by the Poppy but by the Forget Me Not flower.

In the evening students attended the Last Post ceremony at the Menin Gate. On the Tuesday, students visited the Belgian chocolate shop in Ypres square and had some free time. On the final day, students visited Hill 60, the Caterpillar Crater, Passchendaele Museum, and the location of the Christmas Truce in 1914. Soldiers from both sides, ceased hostilities on Christmas Day, exchanged memorabilia and may have had a game of football between both sides with a tin can. Students were able to have their own game of football.





All Hallows Festival of Sports - July 7th

A great day was had by all out on the field and in the sports hall on the annual AH sports day. Students in Years 7 - 10 took part in their two choices from a comprehensive list of sports including football, tag rugby, basketball, netball, volleyball, tennis, boccia, curling and cricket. At the end of each session there was a 4 x 100 meter relay race pitting forms against each other. Year 12 students helped to umpire and organise the matches/games, as well as provide the refreshments and music. When not competing students worked with their form tutors to learn basic first aid and life saving. They also took part in a sports themed quiz. Well done to all students who took part in the day.
